

The South San Francisco community is pulling together to bring a transformative new Community *Civic Campus* to life, complete with a new main Library and Discovery Center, an expansive Parks and Recreation Center, a Community Theatre, a state-of-the-art police operations center with an advanced 911 dispatch center, and 67,000 square feet of open park space. Located along Centennial Trail at the corner of El Camino Real and Chestnut Avenue, the Community Civic Campus will create a visually distinct, high-profile civic presence and contribute to meeting the City's commitment to being a great place to live, work, learn, and play. The project is funded primarily by a new tax approved by South San Francisco voters in late 2015 known as "Measure W."

WHERE WE'RE GOING

- 2018: Early project design has begun and will be completed by the end of the year.
- 2019: Detailed project design will begin in January, which includes the development of construction documents.

FINANCIAL OVERSIGHT

The Measure W Citizens' Oversight Committee was established in 2016 to ensure that Measure W tax revenues and expenditures are correctly collected and spent as expected when the passage of Measure W occurred. Kitchell was contracted by the City to provide program management services for the project. They prepare quarterly reports including information related to budget approvals, expenditures, and contract administration, and provide updates to City Council, as well as the Citizens' Oversight Committee. CITY COUNCIL APPROVES MASTER PLAN FOR DESIGN OF THE COMMUNITY CIVIC CAMPUS PROJECT!

Following a series of public meetings and outreach, the City Council recently approved the overall design of the Civic Campus, directing the architects to proceed with schematic design. This project reflects the city's interest in continued and improved public safety and programs for the public.

The approved project includes four key components: a new state-of-the-art Police Station and 911 dispatch center; a new 75,000 square foot shared Library and Parks & Recreation Center with underbuilding parking and surface parking; a Community Theatre; and 67,000 square foot open space for public use, which can serve as a park or programmed in the future for recreational activities. The design of a new Fire Station will occur but built in a future phase when the redevelopment of the current municipal services site happens.

The library will be significantly larger than the current building at 840 West Orange Avenue. The Parks & Recreation will occupy 34,000 square feet, which includes a 6,000 square foot social hall to house large gatherings, and function as a banquet space with a catering kitchen; and multiple areas of varying size to accommodate expanded Parks and Recreation programs. There will be a separate 5,000 square foot Community Theatre which will host meetings of the City Council, Planning Commission, and other public bodies, while also being available for performances and other community meetings and events.

Once the campus is constructed and operational, the City's Municipal Service Building at 33 Arroyo Drive, will be sold or redeveloped, which will help fund the Community Civic Campus project and build the new Fire Station.

This project will produce a distinct, high-profile civic presence and contribute to highlighting the City's commitment to the safety, education, health, and future of its citizens.
